# Art & Craft

## Diploma in Art & Craft

The aim of the three year full-time diploma is to give students the opportunity to refine and develop art making, professional research and presentation skills. Students work closely with tutors to develop their abilities.

**Year 2:** The emphasis is placed on developing and experimenting with ideas, techniques, processes and exploration of the creative process.

**Year 3:** The emphasis is on refining skills and ideas. Each student follows an individual learning programme designed, in conjunction with the tutors, to meet their specific learning needs and goals.

## Certificate in Art & Craft (Foundation)

This one year qualification covers an interrelated range of art and craft disciplines designed to give students the opportunity to develop their creativity, develop technical skills, discover their strengths, and to build a firm foundation for further study.

Certificate in Art & Craft (Foundation) is the first year of the Diploma in Art and Craft, successful students are accepted into year two of the Diploma in Art & Craft.

## PAINTING

**Tutors:** **Patrick Malone** MFA (Hons) Painting  
**Richard Darbyshire** Art & Craft Dip (Advanced)

The painting programme is aimed at introducing students to the fundamental aspects of painting through the use of a variety of materials and subject matter. Students will be encouraged to develop individual expression and observational skills as well as the opportunity to question their own ideas and concepts.

## CERAMICS

**Tutors:** **Cherrie James** Art & Craft Dip(Advanced). **Richard Darbyshire** Art & Craft Dip (Advanced)

Students will be encouraged to express themselves in clay and develop technical skills and techniques relevant to their stage of development. These will include: clay preparation and properties, throwing, hand building, glazing and a variety of firing and kiln building techniques. Students develop an individual mode of expression and work towards a creative and innovative result.

## SCULPTURE

**Tutor:** **Anna McLeod** BFA (Honours)

Students will learn to use both traditional and modern sculpture techniques, materials and modes of expression. The programme covers a range of materials including clay, plaster, wood, stone, metal and non traditional materials. Senior students are encouraged to experiment with a variety of materials and processes and to develop an individual response to 3D art making.

## JEWELLERY

**Tutors:** **Tracie Taylor**, Diploma in Art & Craft (Advanced)

Using a variety of approaches, students will gain an excellent grounding in a broad range of jewellery making skills. Techniques and materials are explored with a free approach to both the design input and outcome.

## PROFESSIONAL STUDIES

**Tutor:** **Anna McLeod** BFA (Honours)

Covers a variety of skills required to manage a career in the arts, such as legal contracts (e.g. with galleries and dealers), photographing work, portfolio preparation, exhibiting and promotion, tax laws, funding, book keeping and teaching skills.

## LIFE DRAWING

**Tutor:** **Alan Croggon** Diploma in Art & Craft

Using a variety of approaches, students will increase their visual awareness, observational skills, understanding of form and structure; and the development of an individual interpretation. Students experiment in a variety of traditional and contemporary media to build up their drawing and mark making skills.

## DESIGN

**Tutor:** **Alexis Neal** MFA

This challenging course covers theory of design elements, approaches to design, media skills, conceptual skills, research skills and the creative process will be explored using a variety of media and approaches.

# Diploma in Art & Craft (Advanced)

This one year programme aims to assist the students to define and understand the art world and establish their position in it. Students integrate theory, art history, marketing and studio practice. Students are encouraged to show their work, enter the marketplace and work towards a highly professional outcome. While some students go directly from our diploma courses (or similar studies) to the advanced programme, others enrol after having practiced as artists/craftspeople or worked in related industries.

## ART HISTORY

**Tutors:** **Alexis Neal** MFA. **Anna McLeod** BFA (Honours)

The study of Art history enables the student to contextualise art and craft from a variety of periods and cultures and to define their place as an artist. Topics studied include New Zealand art and culture - historical and contemporary, Maori and Pacific, ancient cultures, renaissance and various aspects of European art, modernism, postmodernism. Third and Fourth year students focus increasingly on art theories and postmodernism in order to contextualise their own practice.

## MARKETING & CRITICAL STUDIES

**Tutor:** **Anna McLeod** BFA (Honours)

Part marketing, part theory and art context. This course covers you and the art market, the internet and arts websites, art writing, statements of intent and critical discussion on topics covered in art history.

# General Info

## CERTIFICATE ENTRY CRITERIA

We welcome those who wish to develop their creative and artistic abilities and develop technical skills. Our concern is with the commitment to study and the standard achieved on completing the courses. Maturity and life experience are considered an asset. Applicants are requested to attend an interview and may bring with them examples of their art and/or craft work. Those with prior experience, work or study based, may apply for Recognition of Prior Learning.

## DIPLOMA ENTRY CRITERIA

Those who successfully complete the Certificate in Art and Craft (Foundation) are accepted into Diploma in Art and Craft year two. Those who successfully complete the Certificate in Jewellery are accepted into Diploma in Jewellery year two. Art and Craft Diploma (Advanced): Open to those who have completed the Diploma in Art & Craft, Diploma in Jewellery or a similar study at another institution.

## STUDENT LOANS AND ALLOWANCES

## MATERIALS

The school provides most of the materials required to complete the first year of the qualifications. Students are advised to budget the following amounts for materials:

Certificate/Diploma in Jewellery students are encouraged to purchase a basic set of hand tools in their first year. Tool kits may be purchased through the school for approximately \$700.

## ACCOMMODATION

Batches, farm cottages, houses and flats are usually available in the local area. A youth hostel is situated 13 km's north of Puhoi in Warkworth. We assist students who are seeking accommodation.

## WEEKEND, EVENING AND PART TIME CLASSES

Classes are available in a variety of subjects/materials including: Life Drawing, Painting, Pottery, Jewellery, Sculpture and Mosaic Tiling. For more information please contact the school or visit our website for a calendar of classes.

## QUALIFICATION LENGTHS

Each year of full-time study is 36 weeks, 30 hours per week. Part-time formal study involves 2-3 days per week, 12 to 18 hours, for two years for each equivalent year of full-time study. The specifics of part-time study are on an individual basis and are discussed with the student at the time of their interview.

## EXHIBITIONS AND EVENTS

The school hosts several exhibitions of students work and open days throughout the year. We are committed to supporting our graduates in their creative and professional pursuits. For an events calendar contact the school or visit the website.

## INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS

Applications from International Students are welcomed. International Students may study casually or towards a qualification. Contact the school or visit the website for an International Students Handbook.

## RECOGNITION OF PRIOR LEARNING

If the applicant has completed relevant study at another tertiary institution, they may apply for recognition. This may include study at a tertiary institution in New Zealand or overseas or work in a related field. This can be discussed further at an interview.

# Jewellery

## Diploma in Jewellery

This three year qualification will build a strong foundation of technical and design skills and concepts, workshop management, the boundaries of visual perception, expression and experience in an integrated programme which includes design processes in 2D and 3D materials.

The curriculum is designed to give each student the skills to enter the industry either as a jewellery designer, manufacturing jeweller, self employed studio jeweller or to go onto further study.

## Certificate in Jewellery

This one year qualification is a practical course designed with most of the time spent in the jewellery workshop. Students will learn traditional and contemporary jewellery making and design skills. Students are encouraged to work with a variety of materials and experiment with designs and concepts.

The Certificate in Jewellery is the first year of the Diploma in Jewellery successful students are accepted into year two of the Diploma in Jewellery.

## TECHNICAL & PRACTICAL WORKSHOP SKILLS

Students will learn practical skills in a range of techniques and materials used in the jewellery workshop. Techniques covered include filing, soldering, stone setting, making hinges and catches, reticulation, enameling and repousse resulting in work that is well made and giving students a range of technical possibilities.

## DRAWING, RENDERING & COMPUTER AIDED DESIGN

### *Workshops with an industry professional.*

**Computer Aided Design:** The programme will introduce the student to Computer Aided Design, teaching the basics of 3D digital modelling and rendering. Students will progress to using CAD as a design tool and examining the use of rapid-prototyping to generate a 3D model of their design. **Drawing and Rendering:** Will introduce the student to technical drawing, perspective drawing, presentation drawing and rendering in a variety of media.

## JEWELLERY TECHNOLOGY

To support the practical subjects, students will learn the properties of metals and alloying, chemical treatments, mass production processes and patina's.

## JEWELLERY DESIGN

**Tutor:** Andrea Daly BVA.

This challenging course covers theory of design elements, approaches to jewellery design, media skills, conceptual skills, research skills and the creative process will be explored using a variety of media and approaches.

## JEWELLERY DESIGN SKILLS

In this course students are able to explore and develop the creative process resulting in work that is contemporary and original. Visits to galleries, exhibitions and artist's talks are an important part of this subject, allowing students to question norms and conventions. In most cases the design is made by the students combining the practical skills learned in other subjects.

## ART HISTORY

**Tutors: Alexis Neal MFA.**

The study of Art history enables the student to contextualise art and craft from a variety of periods and cultures and to define their place as an artist. Topics studied include New Zealand art and culture - historical and contemporary, Maori and Pacific, ancient cultures, renaissance and various aspects of European art, modernism, postmodernism. 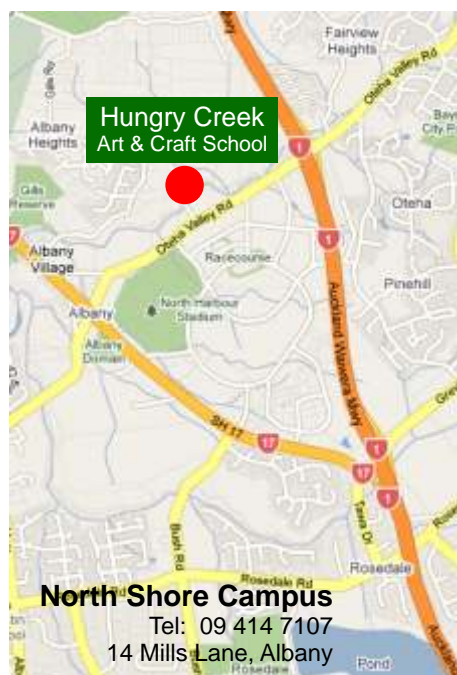
